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2021 Census of Population



2021 Census products provide statistical information about the population, age, sex at birth and gender, type of dwelling, families, households and marital status, Canadian military experience, income, language, Indigenous peoples, housing, immigration, place of birth and citizenship,

ethnocultural and religious diversity, mobility and migration, education, labour, and commuting as measured in the Census Program.

Information within the Census Program web module is organized into broad categories, as follows:

- <u>Topics</u> offers links to the comprehensive suite of 2021 Census standard products associated with each of the 2021 Census of Population releases.
- <u>Data products</u> offers data for a wide range of standard geographic areas, available in the Census Profile, Data tables, Census Program Data Viewer (CPDV) and in the Focus on Geography Series (FoGS). The Data products page presents access to historical census information and release-related features.
- <u>Data tables</u> offers a variety of data tables for the various census topics that have already been released, and also offers data tables that contain the data quality indicators related to most questions of the 2021 Census questionnaire.
- Analytical products offers a variety of analytical products for the various census topics that have already been released.
- Reference materials covers various aspects of the census and are intended to support the use of census data.

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The Indigenous Peoples Survey: Update



The Indigenous Peoples Survey (IPS), conducted only once every 5 years, was in collection from May 11 to November 30, 2022. With the lifting of public health measures, Statistics Canada is happy to announce that the IPS will return to inperson interviews in select regions. Statistics Canada interviewers will be in Nunavut and Nunavik from January 16 to March 31, 2023, as in-person interviews are the most effective

collection method in these regions. Selected respondents from these communities will receive a visit at their home to complete the survey in person.

The IPS is used to support policy and programming activities for a wide range of stakeholders, including Indigenous organizations, communities and governments. The 2022 IPS also includes a Nunavut Inuit Supplement (NIS). The NIS results will be used to help find ways to increase Inuit employment in government, as required by Article 23 of the Nunavut Agreement.

February 6-7, 2023 1:00-3:00pm (ET)	Introduction to Statistics (2 half-day course offered in English) This course will provide participants with a basic understanding of statistics, including key concepts, how data can be interpreted using statistics, and how statistics can help in understanding a particular issue of interest. The course will also discuss how descriptive statistics are calculated and interpreted, for example, averages and distributions.
February 21, 2023 1:00-2:30pm (ET)	Navigating the Statistics Canada Website (offered in English) This course is an introduction to the Statistics Canada website. The course will guide participants through the main sections of the website, focusing on how to access Indigenous statistics as well as how to find key indicators, community-level data, and census data products.
	Preparing Funding Proposals (2 half-day course offered in
February 27-28, 2023 1:00-2:30pm (ET)	English) This course will discuss different components of funding proposals, including developing an idea into a plan, identifying potential funding opportunities, finding the data needed to support the proposal, and how to write the proposal using the data identified.
March 2, 2023 1:00-2:30pm (ET)	Navigating the Statistics Canada Website (offered in French) This course is an introduction to the Statistics Canada website. The course will guide participants through the main sections of the website, focusing on how to access Indigenous statistics as well as how to find key indicators, community-level data, and census data products.
March 20-22, 2023 1:00-3:00pm (ET)	Surveys from Start to Finish (3 half-day course offered in English) This course will provide participants with the basic knowledge needed to understand and evaluate surveys by walking through the steps of the survey process. Topics include questionnaire design, data collection methods, working with the data collected and communicating the results in an accessible way.

Fun Facts:

Early censuses required enumerators to adventure across the country in a camping outfit with pack-horses, dog-trains, and canoes.

The Census communications program once had Census messages on food items such as milk bags and cartons, margarine containers, and sugar packages.

In 1971, a voluntary project in which school children were familiarized with the census involved the participation of one million students. A similar project runs today, called Census at School.

The first known systematic enumeration of the colony population in Canada was first conducted in the winter of 1666–1667 by the first Intendant of New France, Jean Talon.

The word "census" has its roots in Roman times: it is derived from the Latin term "censere," which means "to estimate.
